Maryland Pastel Society is saddened by the recent loss of one of our own. Elizabeth (Betsy) W. Goldsborough passed away in March leaving a legacy of generosity and kindness that many will not soon forget. Betsy was a natural born artist best known for her pastel portraiture. Her formal art education was at The Schuler School of Fine Arts in Baltimore. After she retired as Assistant Registrar at Johns Hopkins Hospital and later as a medical secretary for various physicians in Baltimore, Betsy continued to paint and further her study through workshops. She also provided private instruction in her home studio. Her paintings were shown in local, regional and national exhibitions. She received numerous awards and special recognition for her artwork.

Betsy was a founding member of the Maryland Pastel Society and actively served on the Board. She also served on the Boards of the Baltimore Watercolor Society, the Maryland Society of Portrait Painters and the Art Gallery of Fells Point.

Betsy was a prolific artist who painted countless pastel portraits and landscapes in pastel and watercolor. Her amiable spirit was obvious to all who met her and knew her. She gave generously to causes close to her heart including the environment, the arts and political/peace





Past Events- Winter Meeting

Jean Hirons - Confessions of a Colorist

Color is the most important thing in painting to long-timer MPS member Jean Hirons, who honored us with a landscape demonstration at our Winter meeting in January. She says "color harmony" is more specifically what she is all about. She defines color theory as "having three properties- HUE, VALUE, and CHROMA (saturation). Color temperature is relative."

Jean's decision-making process is methodical. She asks herself three key questions: "Where am I going?" "Where should I begin?" and "How should the color develop?". She prefers working from photographs and begins by studying them carefully for the compositions within. The next step is setting up her color palette which Jean describes as interpretive as well as intuitive. Her palette is always a limited one, and she likes to work with split complements on the color wheel.



On 20"x 20" UART 320 mounted paper, Jean has loosely sketched her composition from the photo reference to her left. She has both a color study and a black and white version of the photo to help her consider value relationships. She states she is not overly concerned with finding a focal point in her compositions.



As Jean begins her underpainting, she is careful that values are correct. "Color doesn't really matter at this stage." Often she will place a warm color in her underpainting where a cool color will ultimately be painted and vice-versa.


Her subject is a sandy rocky beach by a waterway, running behind a row of houses with trees and a distant grassy shore. This is a coastal scene from her home town in Massachusetts and she knows it well. "It helps to be acquainted with your subject when working from photographs," she says. As her underpainting develops, one can detect where the light and shadow will occur. Jean says "The whole point of an underpainting is to create large value shapes." After the underpainting is laid in, a stiff brush is used to carefully paint with Isopropyl Alcohol over

the entire format. Jean is careful not to let colors bleed into each other so as not to lose her well-thoughtout value masses. This "sets" the underpainting and allows additional color to be applied over but not mix with soft pastel from the underpainting.

When the final phase begins, Jean starts at the top of the format and works her way down. That way, she says, the pastel dust does not fall on the rest of the painting from heavily applied areas. As she paints, she plays with color temperature while holding fast to her initial value solutions. The warm yellow underpainting in the water now peaks through the cooler blues and greens in spots, giving the feel of sunlight.

Jean added marks thoughtfully and was careful to allow the underpainting to stay visible here and there, especially in the sky creating luminosity and space. We can feel the warmth of the sun. Even though the painting had yet to be finished, we could see how the underpainting informs the layers of color on top. Shapes that were cool in the underpainting are now warmer, while what was warm is now cooler. Her palette of oranges and blues is harmonious and inviting. Through light and shadow, the eye moves around the composition.

A popular teacher of pastel since 2004. Jean discusses her three approaches to color in her book, Finding Your Style in Pastel. She has been a member of MPS for many years and served as MPS president from 2007-2009. She has taught pastel at Montgomery College, the Yellow Barn, and now teaches at Artists and Makers Studios in Rockville. She is a signature member of the Pastel Society of America and a member of the Master Circle of the International Association of Pastel Societies. Her paintings have won many awards, including the recent "Best Landscape" award in the MPS "Shades of Pastel" national juried exhibition. A Look at Pan Pastels

Just when you think you have all the pastel supplies you need, someone introduces you to PanPastel. You may have seen it advertised. PanPastel consists of small .3 oz square pans of rich, vibrant color created using a special process that combines artist quality pure pigment with minimal binder.

PanPastel, manufactured by ColorFin, is gaining popularity, and has been available on the market for several years. It is an ideal medium for blending to create an infinite palette of colors. PanPastel can be used alone or in combination with traditional stick pastels on most surfaces, from smooth to rough tooth. It work especially well in creating underpaintings by producing broad strokes using large sponges and angel wedges to apply color.

Because PanPastel is applied in a similar technique to painting, it is ideal for creating skyscapes, seascapes, waterfalls, and foggy scenes. More finely detailed and painterly marks can be introduced into a painting using a special Softtool applicator, available with a square, oval, or triangular tip. Load color onto the applicator by gently moving it in a circular motion on the color in the pan.

Changing colors is easily accomplished by wiping the sponge or applicator on a towel or chamois cloth before loading another color. Color-mixing can be accomplished on the paper or in the pan; simply wipe the pan clean first to avoid unwanted results. PanPastel is very versatile and can also be used with non-pastel mediums such as watercolor to create interesting effects.

You may be asking what could be the advantages to yet another form of soft pastel. For one, PanPastel generates very low levels of dust, allowing an artist who has breathing concerns but loves the medium to continue with pastel. Secondly, PanPastel is very forgiving. Undesirable marks can be removed easily using a gum Arabic eraser.

Artist quality PanPastel is lightfast, fully erasable, and is compatible with fixatives. Fixatives can be used to isolate a pastel layer or to provide a better surface on a less toothy surface, depending on your preference. It can be fun to experiment with this technique. Though not essential, fixative can be used to protect the painting.
