FROM THE PRESIDENT'S EASEL

I am sometimes stuck with that artist's block thing. We all have strategies to work through it. I find that tackling a fun challenge is a great way to break through the block. I do a small pastel where I start with a quick and crazy underpainting (e.g., with old colored markers, scribble with a black pen, or a loose watercolor sketch) —some different technique, not worrying about perfection. Sometimes I don't take myself seriously in order to take myself seriously. I may also give myself a well-defined technical challenge, like a painting limited to only analogous colors. Often, those strict boundaries make everything else flow.

I also look to MPS for opportunities that help me break through an artist's block. A workshop or a demo at one of our quarterly meetings, or just chatting with one of our members about a painting they shared at a meeting or on Facebook can be inspirational. Volunteering with an activity, like helping to hang a show, can be a blockbreaker. Look what a difference I can make by just helping someone else on their pastel journey. That can inspire me to break out my pastel box.

Find new inspiration with our MPS pastel community. You might be surprised how much you can gain by getting involved.

— Our Summer Members Meeting, July 22nd, offers a fun hands-on pastel activity. Dig through your reference photos and find one that has a range of values—strong lights and darks. Bring that and a small set of pastels and two 6" x 9" surfaces. An old bath towel will serve as your workspace. For more details, see Next Members Meeting.




"ostritch portrait-In Your Face"

Following the Circle

Each morning **Joyce Turk** steps into her studio and looks at her most recent painting. "It sits on my father's old easel awaiting my next touch. When I was a baby, my father set this easel next to my cradle and rocked me with his foot while he painted. Through the brush lightly stroking the canvas and his foot gently rocking me, he created a circle of energy that connected me to his paintings. My father was my first teacher, and with my mother, my devoted supporter."

"Throughout my childhood and adolescence, my parents furnished me with art supplies and lessons and I increasingly enjoyed the process of creating my own works of art. Yet the call of science was stronger so I followed a career in international livestock development. I found that studying science was a natural outlet for my proclivity to memorize detail. I illustrated my school notes with intricate drawings that I always remembered more easily than the text."

"In college, science was exciting; it was an adventure into the unknown and the path I've followed has been most rewarding. I concentrated my studies in livestock production graduating from Ohio State and Cornell Universities, and served in the U.S. Peace Corps–Philippine Islands. After that, I backpacked alone through Southeast Asia for one year living on \$2 a day[!] My sense of adventure has led me in a myriad of directions, but my intense interest in international livestock development guided me steadily in that career. I carry my art supplies wherever I travel to document the world around me."

"My career in international livestock work has taken me on this path many times around the world. Now I discover the path has led me in a wide circle. I'm back to my father's easel painting the wonders of a wonder–filled world. Oscar Wilde and I agree: 'The true mystery of the world is the visible, not the invisible.' "

"Pastels allow me to paint spontaneously, to depict fleeting light patterns that flit across the mountains, down a valley between cloud patches or skip across glassy water. When I watch colors changing in nature, I can see them on my palette – orange or blue shadows, purple fog, green mountains stippled with pink or mauve. Pastels are crystalline magic, the rainbow of my life, the paving stones of my circular path."

"I describe my artistry as 'a gradual transition from black to white.' I have broadened from painting primarily animals to landscapes rich in design and color, and compare exploring the world of art to exploring my own wonder–filled world that encompasses the jungles of Borneo to African savannahs, the altiplano of South America to the majestic Himalayas. Following the paths of early explorers while creating one of my own has led me toward new horizons."

Joyce Turk's paintings can be found in private collections in Africa, Canada, Europe, and the U.S.

NEXT MEMBERS MEETING: July 22, 2023

Join us at the Summer Members Meeting, July 22nd from Noon to 4pm, for a fun hands-on pastel activity!

Joyce Lister will lead us through an exercise on value. To participate you must bring the following:

- 2 identical pieces of 9" x 6" middle-value gray pastel paper.
- A small set of pastels with a good range of values (no more than 60)
- A reference photo with defined darks and lights, preferably a landscape
- An old bath towel for the table to define your workspace
- A small tabletop easel (optional)

On one piece the darkest shapes in your photo should be equal to and no darker than the mid-gray shade of your paper and the middle value and light shapes In your photo will be proportionately lighter.



The two pieces she produced. Note: You can also divide one $9" \times 12"$ piece of gray paper into two $9" \times 6"$ formats.

On the second piece, the lightest shapes in your photo should be equal to and no lighter than the midgray shade of your paper and the middle value and dark shapes in your photo will be proportionately darker.

We look forward to seeing you on Saturday, July 22nd. For those attending in person, please bring a snack or lunch. We will provide water. Also, bring one of your pastel paintings in any stage to share, and you will be eligible to enter the door prize drawing.

Our live meetings are held at the Gary J. Arthur Community Center, 2400 State Route 97, Glenwood, MD 21723. We will also offer Zoom access to the meeting.

Desmond O'Hagan has been

considered one of the leading urbanscape artists in the world. He is a Master Pastelist with the Pastel Society of America, and is listed in *Who's Who in American Art, Who's Who in America*, and in the Hall of Fame at the Art Institute of Colorado. In May 2005, he was inducted into the International Association of Pastel Societies' Master Circle. In 2018, he was awarded Eminent Pastelist status by IAPS.

Desmond's main focus is to explore the art of "Interpreting Light". He has a very hands-on approach to teaching; working individually with each student. His workshop begins with a digital slideshow of his pastels including two step-by-steps of works in progress. His workshop is designed to help you reach the next level in your pastel painting.

A Tale of Two Colors and an Old Pastel

Three years ago I offered to do quick animal sketches to benefit a dog training company in need. I used pastel sticks and pencils and 8 x 10 pieces of various pastel papers that I had on hand. The sketches took approximately one to two hours to complete. The project was successful and donations were plentiful.

Recently, a client who had purchased three portrait sketches asked me if I could sketch a fourth dog. I agreed and visited their home to view my original sketches and determine the paper I had used. It was Sennelier La Carte, on what I thought might be 'Naples Yellow' and so I ordered it from the Sennelier website. I know it's hard to judge color on a website but I had to make a decision. Two weeks later the package arrived. I took the sheets of 'Naples Yellow' to the client's house to compare the color background with my sample. It wasn't right—too yellow. So I ordered the next closest color that wasn't as yellow, 'Sand'.

Over the years, I have saved small scraps of preferred pastel papers and write the maker and color name on the back. Of course when I needed them, I couldn't find my handful of scraps! When the second delivery of Sennelier paper arrived, 'Sand' was also a bust—too dark! I tore my studio apart looking for my sample scraps and finally found them way in the back of my flat file. I found the Sennelier scrap, labeled 'Naples Yellow' and held it next to the new 'Naples Yellow' sheets. They were not the same! What was going on here? My scrap samples were not exposed to the light at the back of that flat file. Had Sennelier changed the color? I was never to know the answer. What I did know was I had a piece of artwork to do.

I had to find a pastel stick that would change the new 'Naples Yellow' to match the original artwork. Every pastel stick and pencil I own was spread out on every flat surface in the studio. I found a nub of an old Weber pastel of a certain shade of yellow ochre. (Yes! That's how old I am and how long I have been working in pastels.) The combination of the 'Naples Yellow' surface color and the old Weber yellow ochre did the trick. Most importantly, in the end the client was happy.

There are a couple of morals to this story which you can figure out for yourselves. As for me, I'm still saving every scrap of pastel paper and writing vital info on the back of them!


